

What rate of tax applies to my income and gains?

The answer to this question depends on the source and type of the income or gain. The chart below sets out the maximum tax rates that could apply in 2026 to various sources of income and gains.

1. Individuals aged 66 or over are exempt from PRSI. The rate of PRSI will increase to 4.35% from 1 October 2026.
2. Maximum USC for individuals aged 70 or over and with income below EUR60,000 is 2%.
3. Individuals liable to tax at the standard rate will pay a maximum tax rate of 37.2%, assuming tax return is filed on time.
4. These rates also apply to funds located in an OECD country with which Ireland has a Double Tax Agreement.
5. Artists' income up to EUR50,000 is exempt from income tax.
6. 10% rate applies to gains up to EUR1.5m. 33% applies on excess above EUR1.5m.
